

# Video Seminar: Observation of Infants and Young Children Child Psychoanalysis, BPSI Fall 2021, Monday evenings, 8:00 pm

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#### Overview:

Observation of infants with parents was started at Tavistock in London and has been used for over 50 years to teach about development of the earliest relationship, as well as to look at early developmental capacities of the infant, and to learn about development as a process involving the infant and child in their caregiving relationships. Infant observation has been used in psychoanalytic training to help therapists learn analytic techniques related: to watching and waiting, as opposed to intervening; becoming attuned to early communications through attention to non-verbal behaviors; and gaining awareness of the interactive nature of nonverbal as well as verbal communication.

In this class we will use videos to show the development of relationships of infants and young children. We will look at videos of young children in interaction as examples of "normal" or typical development. We will also look at videos of young children in therapeutic situations to highlight the importance of both verbal and nonverbal communications in treatment of children. We will also discuss readings of classic infant observation papers and of current scientific knowledge of developmental research.

We have included one required reading, one optional reading, and a list of some (of many) other readings for further exploration at the end of the syllabus.
